Dear Alumni,

This has certainly been a year for the ages. I am even tempted to quote Charles Dickens, "It was the best of times; it was the worst of times," to describe this past school year. My feeling is that there were no worst of times; even the lowest of times have taught us so many things! We simply need to listen as God whispers his message of hope.

As a family and community of faith at BC, this past December we experienced a deeply sad time when we lost one of our own. Anthony Myers, a junior, passed away after a year-long courageous battle with cancer. We continue to remember Anthony and to pray for his family.

During the school year, many opportunities were presented to our students to be with God. Students attended Masses, reconciliation services, met with priests during Catholic Schools Week, prayed the rosary, attended Kairos and class retreats, and completed thousands of hours of service. During our quarantine, Father Isaac live streamed Masses and other prayer services for our students and the BC community.

Academically, we graduated 183 seniors. They are off to 66 different universities including some of the most selective schools in the country, among them American University, Boston College, Bucknell, William & Mary, Lafayette, Dickinson, Fordham University, Franklin & Marshall, Gettysburg, Lehigh, George Washington University, University of Richmond, Ursinus, and Villanova, and they earned tens of millions of dollars in scholarships. Eighteen of our students will be playing sports at the collegiate level.

We hosted many events throughout the year including our Fall play, "Clue" and our Spring musical, "Godspell." Our sports teams took to the fields and courts, continuing the great BC tradition of excellence. We held many inductions, Spirit Week, and Catholic Schools Week. We certainly had lots of fun!

preparation. I am so proud and honored to
work with all the people at BC. They have
been extraordinary!

During the Pandemic, we moved our education online, held our athletic and academic awards ceremonies on YouTube, held a "QuarenProm" on Facebook with a live DJ, and had a unique and memorable graduation event in our parking lot. Seniors decorated their cars and drove through the lot, walked across a stage to Pomp and Circumstances to receive their diplomas while their families and our faculty cheered them on

This summer, we are working hard to prepare academically for whatever format we must follow. Academics and online learning are not mutually exclusive, and if necessary, we will be able to do both at the same time. The health and safety or our students, their families, and our staff is our biggest concern.

I would like to thank all of you, our alumni, for your support during the year, but most especially during these challenging times. 
A Distinguished - Land Market - Land Market

ongratulations to Berks Catholic's 2020-2021 Distinguished Alumnus, Stephen Banco. Steve is a 1984 graduate of Holy Name High School where he was the Most Outstanding Athlete in 1983 and 1984 and was inducted into Holy Name's Hall of Fame in 2011. A member of St. Ignatius Loyola Parish, Steve also attended St. Ignatius Loyola School. He graduated from Lehigh University with a BS in Finance and was a four-year letterman at two positions: Free Safety and Punter, At Lehigh, Steve was third all-time for interceptions in a career. He was ranked 10th in the nation in 1985 for punting average, and 7th in 1986 for interceptions. In 1987, Steve was named Football MVP.

He graduated from Jefferson Medical College in 1996 and was the Most Outstanding Resident in 2001 at Thomas Jefferson University where he did his Orthopaedic Surgery Residency. He completed his Spinal Surgery Fellowship at New England Baptist Hospital in 2002 and was a member of the Editorial Review Board at Clinical Spine Surgery. Steve started his own spinal surgery private practice in 2002, is President of Keystone Spine & Pain Management, a Fellow of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery, and partial owner of the Surgical Institute of Reading.

Steve was a member of the Board of Directors at Berks Catholic from our formation in 2011 until 2015 when his daughter became a freshman. Steve and his wife Lisa are committed supporters of Berks Catholic and Catholic education in Berks County and made a transformational gift to the Excellence Faith Future Capital Campaign in 2015. Steve was also a Kiss-A-Pig Candidate where he raised money for the Olivet's Boys and Girls Club of Reading. Steve has achieved noteworthy success in his life by working hard and remaining steadfast to the morals and disciplines he learned in Catholic school. Additionally, his commitment of time, talent and treasure to Berks Catholic and to other philanthropic efforts in the community set an example for our current students of the importance of giving back to your community.




Rahul Mannepuli | Salutatorian

Classof2020 Outcomes & Overview

▶ Economic and societal impacts of the Corona Pandemic have caused some colleges to extend enrollment deadlines and families to reassess college plans. This has caused a delay in getting complete, accurate college data. This report will be updated as information continues to be submitted.

Overview

The Class of 2020 received 559 offers of admission to 169 different colleges and universities in 24 different states, Washington DC, and the United Kingdom.

90% + of the Class of 2020 will matriculate at 68 different 4- and 2-year institutions in 15 different states, Washington DC and the United Kingdom.

The Class of 2020 was awarded \$19.3 million in the form of scholarship monies for academic, athletic, and other talent-based merits as well as for service to community. Included in this count are full-tuition scholarships and/or the maximum award offered by the institution.

The Class of 2020 will serve in the Army, Navy, National Guard, and Civil Air Patrol, take Gap Year's to work in computer software development, enter the workforce, return to their home countries to continue education, and pursue training to acquire commercial pilot licensure.

A Closer Look

Members of the Class of 2020 have been invited to and will continue their studies in Honors Colleges and Honors Programs at a variety of different institutions: Catholic Univ. of America, Drexel Univ., Duquesne Univ., Elizabethtown Coll., Marist Coll., Nova Southeastern Univ., St. Joseph's Univ., Univ. of Delaware, Univ. of Central Florida, Univ. of Tampa

40% of those schools offering admission to the C' 2020 Saints also awarded merit-based scholarships and grants.

Among the many majors and areas of study they will pursue are Allied Health & Rehabilitative Sciences, Athletic Training, Aviation Management, Business, Culinary Arts, Economics, Education, Engineering, Fashion Design and Management, Fire-Science Technology, Hospitality & Sports Management, Humanities & Social Sciences, Music Performance, Natural & Physical Sciences, Public Health, Visual & Performing Arts, Wildlife Conservation & Biology.

Members of the Class of 2020 will continue as collegiate student-athletes at 15 different NCAA Division II, III, and NJCAA institutions in the following sports: Baseball, Basketball, Field Hockey, Football, Golf, Lacrosse, Soccer, Softball, Swimming, Track & Field, Volleyball, and Water Polo.





Saints in Service

he BC Pro Life Club under the direction of Mrs. Kim Staub held BC's annual blood drive. Great to have Gabby Geltz (BC 2015) and Alexis Roman (BC 2012) from Miller-Keystone Blood Center back in the building to help faculty moderator, Mrs. Kim Staub.

The Berks Catholic Recycling Club (or BC Green Team) continued to serve the school with its weekly pick up of classroom recycling. Boxes were placed in each classroom, and Friday afternoons were dedicated to the pickup from classroom and offices.

In the fall, the club hosted a Clothing Reuse drive. Students brought to school gently used articles from their own closets, and at the same time they chose "new" items to refresh their own wardrobes.

The Green team Officers were invited in the fall to the Berks Nature Yearly State of the County Breakfast. Here, the team learned of the importance of being outdoors as a key to better health and well-being. The officers took this back to the club, hopefully inspiring more outdoor time

The BC Saints Who Serve Club strives to provide service locally, nationally, and globally. This spring several members served at the Souper Bowl at the Crown Plaza in Reading. Proceeds from this event were directed to Opportunity House in Reading. Also in the spring a team of student provided after-school companionship at a game "night" at a local Daysprings Home. Angel Scholarship Fund

EITC/OSTC

Gifts of Stock

If you have owned a stock for more than 12 months and it has appreciated in value during that time, you would incur a capital gains tax by selling it. However, if you give that stock to Berks Catholic as a gift, you avoid the capital gains tax and can also claim an income tax deduction for the full fair market value of the gift up to an amount equal to 30% of your adjusted gross income. Any unused deduction may be carried forward for up to five vears. Electronic Transfers of Shares of Publicly Traded Stock and Mutual Funds Shares of publicly traded companies and mutual funds may be transferred electronically to Berks Catholic.

In Memoriam

Gifts can be made in memory of a deceased loved one who has designated Berks Catholic as the recipient of gifts upon his or her death. Donations can also be made in memory of any deceased Berks Catholic, Central Catholic, or Holy Name classmate.


